








About the Survey

- 380 presidents at 2- and 4-year colleges and universities
- 206 public, 174 private nonprofit institutions represented
- Margin of error: 4.7%
- Response rate: 17.6%
- Partnered with Hanover Research






Key Findings

Presidents On: Financial Stability

Presidents express their level of agreement with the following on institutional financial stability:




- 82% are confident their institution will be financially stable over the next 5 years, 80% over next 10 years
- Very few lack confidence in future as a freestanding institution by 2030
- 16% say that senior administrators at their institution have had serious internal merger discussions in the last year; most of these presidents support merging



Presidents On: Artificial Intelligence

Presidents who indicate the following on AI (n=376):




- 50% are optimistic about Al's growing impact on higher ed
- Few are very concerned
- 34% agree that their institution is prepared to handle the rise of AI vs. 17% who agree higher ed as a whole is prepared to handle it
- Top use of AI is virtual chat assistants and chatbots (45%)
- 18% say their institution has developed a policy governing the use of AI, including teaching and research; 59% say such a policy is in development



Presidents On: Politics, Policy and the Election

Presidents who indicate the following about the upcoming presidential election (n=373):



- 33% are satisfied with what Biden's accomplished in higher ed so far;
 41% are dissatisfied
- 55% are highly concerned about the 2024 election results affecting the climate for DEI at their institution
- 53% are highly concerned about climate for free inquiry and dialogue at their institution following the election, w/ elevated rates of concern among women and LGBTQIA+ presidents
- 27% are highly concerned about the election results affecting their institution's financial outlook



Presidents On: Campus Speech

Share of presidents who indicate the following on campus speech:


Agree that the climate for open inquiry and dialogue at their campus is good or excellent (n=373)

Agree that the climate for open inquiry and dialogue in higher ed generally is good or excellent (n=373)

Agree, somewhat or strongly, that their institution applies its campus speech policies fairly across topics and groups (n=371)

Agree, somewhat or strongly, that higher ed institutions as a whole apply their campus speech policies fairly across topics and groups (n=371)

Agree, somewhat or strongly, that current world events have stressed their institution's speech policies to the point that they may need to be revised (n=368)




- 82% rate their campus climate for open inquiry and dialogue positively vs. 30% who say this of higher ed as a whole
- 93% say their institution applies its campus speech policies fairly across topics and groups vs. 54% for higher ed as a whole
- 21% agree that current world events stressed their campus speech policies enough that they may need revisiting
- 83% have taken step(s) to educate campus on free speech/promote dialogue



Presidents On: Public Perceptions of Higher Ed

Presidents who most attribute declining confidence in higher ed to the following factors, plus share of presidents who say those same concerns are very or extremely valid (n=366):




- 66% are highly concerned about the state of public confidence in higher ed today
- 36% attribute drop to concerns about affordability, and 57% deem this particular public concern to be highly valid
- 27% attribute drop to workforce preparation concerns



Presidents On: The Campus Workplace


Presidents who indicate the following shares of their nonfaculty staff and faculty members are working in flexible, hybrid or fully remote arrangements this spring (n=366):



- 61% say that up to a 1/4 of nonfaculty staff is working in a flexible, hybrid or remote position, similar to faculty share
- 23% say that staff can work remotely up to one day a week
- 54% say that worker productivity stayed the same under flexible work policies before/during the pandemic
- 65% have increased faculty development opportunities in last 12 months, 62% made special effort to increase pay

Presidents On: Mental Health

Presidents (n=362) who say their institution has taken the following non-clinical step(s) to promote mental health and well-being on campus since 2020 (multiple selections allowed):




- 57% agree that their institution has sufficient clinical capacity to meet the mental health needs of undergraduates
- 94% have taken at least one non-clinical step to promote health and well-being on their campus since 2020
- 77% have promoted social connection and campus involvement; 70% have invested in services and facilities to promote overall well-being
- Presidents' top reported drivers of mental health crisis: social media (86%) and decreased socialization skills (74%)
- Just 42% say academic stress is top driver



Presidents On: Management and Governance

Presidents who somewhat or strongly agree with the following about management and governance (n=359):



Higher education as a whole has been successful in translating lessons learned during the pandemic into lasting, positive change


Their institution has too many academic programs for its current and anticipated levels of enrollment and some need to close

Shared governance at their institution is stronger today than it was before the pandemic

Shared governance in higher education in general is stronger today than it was before the pandemic

They are more likely to discourage talented colleagues or mentees from pursuing the presidency today than they were before 2020

Donor efforts to influence strategy and policy is an increasing risk for their institution




- 73% say their institution was successful in translating lessons learned during the pandemic into lasting, positive change vs. 48% who say same of higher ed as a whole
- 32% say they're more likely now than in 2020 to discourage a talented colleague from pursuing the presidency
- Hardest aspect of being a president: financial constraints (25%) and enrollment challenges (20%)
- 20% say donor attempts to influence strategy and policy is an increasing risk for their institution



Presidents On: Campus Race Relations

Presidents rate the state of race relations at their institution and across higher ed:



- 83% rate race relations on their campus good or excellent vs. 38% for higher ed as a whole
- 14% say their institution previously practiced race-conscious admissions; most of these have changed admissions policies since SCOTUS decision (2023)
- 86% presidents over all say their institution will be able to maintain its current level of diversity under the decision, vs. 63% of presidents whose institutions previously practiced affirmative action
- Very few say their institutions have curtailed DEI measures beyond admissions since last year
